Transitional Housing Offers New Beginnings

Who are we?

The Transitional Housing Program is a collaborative effort begun in 1997, and is run by two local Soroptimist International clubs—Poway and Rancho Bernardo. These clubs provide the overall coordination of the program, working with Crisis House to identify and manage families, and Community HousingWorks to locate units.

What is Transitional Housing?

This program provides families escaping domestic violence with up to 18 months of support, giving them a chance to get on their feet financially, locate a job, stabilize the children in schools, and ultimately find permanent housing. Families live in a rent-subsidized unit and receive weekly case management, counseling, job training, and referrals to other resources as needed.

Is there a need for this program?

Families escaping violence are limited to 60 days in a secured emergency shelter. Without long-term programs such as Transitional Housing, they would have limited options and many would end up returning to their abuser.

More than two domestic violence incidents are reported to law enforcement every hour of every day. In 2004, there were over 21,000 incidents reported in San Diego County. The impact is even greater when you consider the fact that many incidents go unreported.



Lisa's Story

It wasn't long after we were married that Ted developed a temper. When he started to hit me, I thought it was my fault; that if only I were a better wife, things would go back to the way they were. I didn't know what to do. I was alone and miserable, and filled with guilt. But, when I got pregnant with Sherri, I realized that I had to make a change for her sake. I tried to leave a few times, but couldn't find the courage to actually do it. Then during a fight a few months later, I lost my balance and fell, and Ted kicked me in the stomach. I was so frightened I would lose my child that I left right then, with nothing.

After a few days of living in the car, a friend directed me to an emergency shelter, and I was eventually placed in a Transitional Housing unit. The apartment was fully furnished with everything I needed. I received counseling, financial assistance, and met my mentor Judy, who was by my side when Sherri was born. Sherri is the light of my life and every time I look at her, I know I did the right thing when I left Ted. I am eternally grateful for the people who helped us start over. My little girl thinks that home is a happy and loving place, and I am thankful that she is right.

How can I help?

There are a variety of ways you can help these families:
